"Community Awareness" from Police Chief Steve Boven

Dear Members of the Wilmore Community,

I have asked Kim Deyer to run this article, which was run in the Cadillac Evening News in Cadillac, Michigan. I know that this type of scam is still tried today. I know because I get them every week on my computer at the police department. The sad thing is, these scammers are sometimes successful in scamming good people out of their money. As it states in the companion article of this issue, "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

NIGERIAN LETTER SCAM STILL CIRCULATING
Cadillac News, Cadillac, Michigan

CADILLAC - At first I just laughed and hit delete. Last December I received an e-mail from Rebecca Soro of the Ivory Coast begging for my help. She needed to transfer \$10.5 million out of the country after the death of her father who "died due to the political problem." She said the spirit of the Almighty God directed her to me.

Last week I received a second e-mail proposition from a Keynesian attorney based in London representing a deceased client who lost his wife and three children in a plane "clash." "I decided to contact you purely on the personal conviction of trust and confidence that we can co-operate with each other and do a very lucrative business." He wants me to be the next of kin to the deceased and help him transfer \$50 million out of the country.

I thought these e-mail scams were a thing of the past since "60 Minutes" exposed them as a huge international racket run by gangsters.

But these scams are still generating, according to one estimate, over \$1 million every single day. The Better Business Bureau reported that the Secret Service receives 100 phone calls a day about the Nigerian Advanced Fee scam and that it possibly grosses hundreds of millions of dollars annually.

Locally, the Michigan State Police receive complaints about these scams every week.

"We get questions on this probably three to four times a week," reported Sgt. Mike Salasky, who added that their office recently received a Consumer Alert from Attorney General Mike Cox regarding the Nigerian Letter scam and counterfeit cashier's check scams.

"There have been people locally that have cashed the (counterfeit) checks," Salasky said. "And they say the bank tells them they owe money for non-sufficient funds. They are stuck."

Four years ago a Cadillac man cashed a counterfeit check from Nigeria in what The Cadillac News called a "love scam." The man established a relationship with a woman on the Internet and after three months, she wanted to meet him in person. The woman said she needed travel money from her uncle so "she convinced the local man that her ~uncle' was sending a certified bank check." When the \$30,000 check arrived, the man then opened a savings account with the counterfeit check and wired \$9,000 to Africa.

Salasky said that he believes people fall for these scams because they are vulnerable.

"It's the same old adage," he said. "If it's too good to be true, don't do it. People look at these letters and they think they have a chance to make some money. We've seen some from Canada recently that tell people they have won a prize. Don't fall for it."

Victims of these scams come from all walks of life. A former Democratic Congressman from Iowa, Ed Mezvinsky, is serving a seven-year sentence for fraud after getting caught up in a series of Nigerian e-mail scams. In 2006 an ABC 20/20 news report said that Mezvinsky became the victim of "just about every different kind of African-based scam we've ever seen."

Salsaky said that if people get something in the mail resembling one of these scams, they should shred it. If it arrives by e-mail, they need to delete it. "I know this advice sounds simplistic," he said. "This is a variation of the telephone scam where you just hang up."

If a letter arrives in the mail that appears to be a scam, the postal service should be contacted. If the letter or e-mail is from Michigan, then the Michigan State Police can investigate. If the fraud originates out of the state, the Secret Service needs to be contacted.

A Kentuckian whose political genius made him one of the greatest statesman of the nineteenth century will live again when Kentucky Chautauqua presents George McGee in a compelling living history portrayal of Henry Clay (1777-1852).

Despite never quite achieving his dearest ambition -- the presidency -- Henry Clay made an indelible mark on the history of his country, which he served as a Senator, as Speaker of the House, and as Secretary of State. Born and educated in Virginia, Clay moved to Kentucky and set up a law practice in Lexington in 1797. Elected to the state legislature in 1803, he won a seat in the U. S. House in 1811.

For the next forty years, he was a major player on the national political scene, winning fame as the Great Compromiser. Slavery posed a large political and personal quandary for Clay. A slaveholder himself, he advocated gradual emancipation and colonization in Africa. In Congress, he opposed extension of slavery into the new western states. Clay died in Washington in 1852 and is buried in Lexington Cemetery.

Henry Clay is portrayed by George McGee of Georgetown. He is director of theater at Georgetown College and a veteran actor who has worked on the stage, in films, and on network television. He will appear "in character" and costume for this event.

The event is free and open to the public. The program is funded in part by the Kentucky Humanities Council and the National Endowment for the Humanities, and is sponsored by the Wilmore Community Development Board.

Attendees may buy their meals through the buffet or carry lunch into the program. Parking is available near the United Methodist Church.

BRIDGMAN - If a \$5,000 grant sounds too good to be true, that's because it is.

Michigan State Police in Bridgman said Monday they'd received a number of complaints from elderly residents regarding the telephone and e-mail solicitations. The seniors reportedly told police the callers advised they'd be required to submit processing fees costing \$200 to \$400 to receive the payments.

They were asked also for bank information so the money could be automatically withdrawn.

Police said investigation revealed the calls are a scam, with seniors receiving paperwork to apply only for a possible grant. Anyone who has received such a request should disregard it, police said. Anyone who has already provided banking information should contact his or her financial institution and change account numbers.

Tips to help when cooking meals:

With lifestyles now, we are at our most vulnerable time when we cook, people worry about sight, smell and taste of the meal. When preparing and serving foods, the problem comes when the food is sampled during the cooking time. We all want to present a good looking plate that smells and tastes wonderful, but sampling can turn into a full meal by the time the food is cooked. Then, sitting down at the table to eat, two meals have been consumed. This process can be changed. When preparing food for a meal, try these steps:

- 1) Read the recipe, gather and measure all ingredients together. Put away all unused ingredients, do not allow yourself to be tempted by extra food left sitting around while you cook.
- 2) If you feel too tempted by hunger before you cook, eat a light snack of raw veggies prepared and stored in your refrigerator beforehand. This helps to keep the temptation of eating down while cooking without consuming a lot of calories.
- 3) Do not be tempted to taste the food while cooking; only make enough for the people at your table. Any extra food after the meal will be a temptation to nibble and consume extra calories.
- 4) Baking, grilling or steaming food will cut down on fats. Trim fat from meats and use low fat cheese and milk; this helps to cut down on fat as well. When stir frying, use a small amount of oil, vegetables should only be cooked to a tender but partially raw stage to retain the vitamin content.
- 5) Use whole wheat pasta, bread and brown rice. These add more fiber and flavor to the meal. Use spices for flavoring your food and cut down on salt and sugar. Use the zest of a lemon or an orange to flavor your food as well.

Journal your food intake and your exercise program. Don't give up; you are on a path to weight loss. If you have problems today, keep trying. Nothing worthwhile has ever been accomplished by quitting. You can do it!

How To Work That Walk!

Not sure where to begin with your walking workout? Use the following guidelines to get going:

* Start by walking at a local middle school or high school track. Work your way up to four complete laps, which equals one mile on a standard track.

* Treat yourself to a pair of good walking shoes. They needn't be expensive, but make sure they offer good arch support and have comfortable, cushioned soles. If you walk three days a week, the shoes should last six months. Replace them as needed for good shock absorption.

Chinese steamer, bound for Corman, arrives stateside

January, 2008

NEW ORLEANS - R.J. Corman Railroad Group's Chinese QJ 2-10-2 No. 7040 arrived in port Dec. 24 after a trip across the ocean, and is expected to arrive at a Corman property in Lexington, Ky., in mid-January.

The locomotive was unloaded from Chipolbrok Chinese-Polish Joint Stock Shipping Co.'s M/S Yongxing on Dec. 27, and was loaded onto a heavy-duty QTTX flatcar with the tender following on an HTTX 60-foot flat equipped with tie-down chains. Final clearance measurements were being taken, and after Norfolk Southern's clearance department in Atlanta gives the nod, New Orleans Public Belt is scheduled to deliver the engine to NS on Monday, Jan. 7.

Once the 7040 arrives in Lexington, crews will reinstall components such as injectors that were removed to permit lifting of the locomotive. Work will be conducted in accordance with the Form 4/FRA Part 230 inspection process so the engine can receive her federal certification. Once that's done, test runs will be conducted to ensure the 7040's functionality for special events service on RJC's Central Kentucky Lines.

In February 2006, the 7040 was identified for export by Henry Posner III's Railroad Development Corp. and Multipower International, along with sisters 6988, 6998, 7002, and 7081. The locomotives were towed to CNR's 701 Factory near Jinzhou, China. The 6988 and 7081 were rebuilt for RDC and subsequently placed into service on its Iowa Interstate Railroad. Posner sold the 7040 to Corman, and, sadly, the Chinese scrapped the 6998 and 7002 in early December. However, there are sufficient QJs surviving in industrial service that additional locomotives can be imported should market conditions justify. This was RDC's second locomotive import into the USA in 2007, the first being the two 3-foot gauge GE diesels from Panama received by Oregon's Sumpter Valley Railway in October.

Matt Schwerin, Corman's manager of operating practices, and Dennis Daugherty, chief mechanical officer for the California State Railroad Museum and Posner's project manager for repairs to his QJs, traveled to the 701 Factory in July and early August to supervise the 7040 project. Along with new boiler/superheater tubes and rebuilt running gear, many FRA-mandated modifications were made, including bolted safety appliances such as steps, ladders, and handrails and bells.
