WHAT'S IN A NAME? **WHY BETHEL POINTE AND ACADEMY DRIVE?**

The first Methodist school west of the Appalachian Mountains and second Methodist school in the United States was Bethel Academy, founded in 1794 by Bishop Francis Asbury. Mr. Thomas Lewis gave one hundred acres of land four miles southeast of Wilmore, located near High Bridge on cliffs overlooking the Kentucky River, on which to build the school. Rev. John Metcalf and Rev. Francis Poythress were among the builders and early teachers

In late 1801 or Spring of 1802, Rev. Metcalf opened another school for boys, first located in his home in Nicholasville, then in a log structure next door. He called it Bethel Academy although the original Bethel Academy was still in operation. (Rev. Metcalf also founded a Methodist church in Nicholasville.)

When the original Bethel Academy closed ca. 1804 due to lack of funds and Indian hostilities, Rev. Metcalf, without permission, took all of the furnishings to his school in Nicholasville. For this, he was suspended from the Methodist ministry for one year.

There were four or five Bethel Academies in Nicholasville, which eventually became the Jessamine County School System.

Asbury College was founded in 1890 on Main Street, Wilmore, Kentucky, by Dr. John Wesley Hughes. In addition to college courses, Asbury offered a "Preparatory Department." By 1903, it was called Asbury Academy. In 1920, the name was changed to Bethel Academy. For a while, the Academy had a larger enrollment than the College because most students who came to Asbury were not prepared for advanced college courses. The name was changed again in 1931 to Asbury High School, which closed in 1938.

The names, Bethel Pointe and Academy Drive, probably came from the Bethel Academy at Asbury College.

Marino Diaz's hobby is painting eggs for Easter and Christmas. He shares them with family members and friends. First, the design is sketched with a pencil on a raw egg. He heats a "kistka" which is a kind of pen, over a candle. The kistka has a small barrel that holds melted bees wax. Psyanky is similar in concept to batique. Wax and dyes are used. It starts by applying light dye colors and wax, then repeating with a darker dye and more wax. The wax preserves the color and design as more colors are applied.

This ancient technique was used to communicate Christianity. Painted symbols such as the "Sun" became the "Son". The ancient customs were absorbed into the Christian celebration of Christ's resurrection. On Easter the triangle designs on the eggs that had represented air, fire and water, now became the symbols for the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The old supernatural powers in the decorated eggs were gradually attributed to almighty God.

The new meanings blended so harmoniously with the old that even today the mixture of Pagan and Christian symbolism can be seen in the designs.

Other symbols include: butterflies - the resurrection, triangles - the Trinity, netting (looks like crosshatch) - symbolizes Jesus as a fisherman, dots - Mary's tears at the crucifixion, a cross - the crucifixion and animals symbolize - good health, wealth and prosperity.

"TOPS" - Take Off Pounds Sensibly

If you are attending a holiday dinner, here are some suggestions on handling situations at the table.

Have a snack or meal before you go so you do not overeat; and keep water in hand to fill you up when hunger strikes. Enjoy your holiday with activities instead of food; you will win in the end!

Take a small portion of what is offered and take small bites of each, and you can say no to some and not offend the host or hostess, but do not be critical of the meal. Roast or broil the meat and do not add sugars or sugared fruits to the ham if you are cooking, and if you are a guest choose the center cuts to avoid the sugars and fats.

Inquire if you can make a dish and make it low fat and low calorie. Make the best choice you can for each food. Make imaginary lines on your plate, and divide the plate in half, which will be for vegetables. Now divide the other half into two parts. Make one part for your meat and the other for pasta or potatoes. Add a salad on the side, but limit the salad dressing and other toppings that add calories and fat. Mustard is a good substitute for mayonnaise in most recipes. Be careful to watch your chocolate and candy intake; these will have trans fats, calories, sugars, and caffeine in them.
