***The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet
\$29.5 million project
to widen US 68***

The \$29.5 million project contract was awarded to The Allen Company and provides for the continued widening of US 68 to four lanes, from just south of Southland Christian Church to within 1500 feet of the intersection with KY 29 north of Wilmore. The project will also include the construction of a separate multi-use pedestrian/bicycle path throughout the approximate seven (7) mile length as well as an extensive landscaping plan consisting of over 1200 native trees.

"Harrodsburg Road serves as a major thoroughfare for the citizens of Jessamine, Fayette and numerous surrounding counties," said Senator Tom Buford (R-Nicholasville). "It is imperative that we maintain this route in a manner that will provide motorists with improved safety and visibility as it serves as a major contributor to continued economic growth and improved quality of life for citizens of the Bluegrass."

State Representative Robert Damron (D-Nicholasville) said "Jessamine County is a strong and vibrant community that must have a highway system that can accommodate the growth it continues to experience. This much needed and long awaited project will make it easier to move goods and services, and it will be safer for citizens."

Work on the project has begun; completion will take approximately two construction seasons. The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet asks that motorists use extreme caution when traveling through the work zone. All work is scheduled on a tentative basis and is subject to change depending on weather conditions, emergencies and other factors beyond the control of the Department of Highways.

Motorists are encouraged to dial 511 from their cellular phone, or log on at www.511.ky.gov, for updated project information. Variable Message Boards and other traffic control devices will be in place to alert motorists of the changes within the work zone.

As you travel north on US 68 from Wilmore, part of the project work on the west side is redesigning the connecting points for US 68 and US 169. An intersection will replace the current road design. The project will also redesign Murphy Lane and US 29 - Wilmore Road (the road going toward Nicholasville). Most project work does not hold up traffic on US 68. Occasionally, there might be a need to close the road for short periods while moving equipment.

The project is projected for completion by Sept. 2009.

Dig In!

Want an excuse to play in the dirt? Here's one; gardening is good for you! It's true! Digging holes, mowing the lawn, and pushing wheelbarrows can burn tons of calories while keeping your heart, lungs, and circulatory systems in top shape! All that lifting and tugging will also lead to stronger muscles and bones!

Just look at the calories you can burn by exercising that green thumb:

Calorie Counting Made Easy

Counting the number of calories you consume daily is a must if you want to reach your goal weight. After all, how will the "calories in, calories out" weight-loss formula work if you have no idea how many you eat every day?

Getting an accurate calorie tally is easy on days when you can measure all the meals and snacks you prepare with the help of measuring cups and a scale. Once you've measured, you can get the right number by adding up the calories based on portion size. But, how can you estimate calories when you can't measure ahead of time?

If you find yourself in a situation where you can't measure your servings, here are some useful tips for assessing portion sizes using your hand:

* The size of your fist is roughly equal to a cup-size serving of cereal, wild rice, black beans, etc.

What's the voice inside your head saying about your efforts to lose weight and get fit? Are the messages positive and encouraging, or just the opposite?

Make a conscious effort today to take note of your inner chatter so you can see if it's helping you. If not, you can learn to look on the sunny side – it just takes some practice, say experts from the Mayo Clinic. The secret? Take note of the negative messages and replace them with a positive spin! Here are some examples:

* Instead of "I can't stick to a diet," think "I know I can do this!"

* Instead of "This won't work," think "I can make this work!"

* Instead of "It's a waste of time," think "It will be worth the extra effort!"

* Instead of "It's not going to make a difference," think "I'll never know unless I try!"

* Instead of "It hasn't worked before," think "I'll try again!"

* Instead of "I've already tried," think "I can learn from my mistakes!"

* Instead of "I don't like that (food, exercise, etc.)," think "I'm excited to try new things!"

Leaders can participate in talkback sessions with festival artists, listen to seminars from great speakers including author Justin Lookadoo, grab some helpful resources, or just relax and enjoy complimentary refreshments.

Festival attendees will also have a new option among the myriad of usual festival activities. The American Cornhole Organization has sanctioned an open cornhole tournament to be played during the festival. Attendees can purchase an all-day pass to play at the festival or in advance from the ACO website.

While Ichthus:08 isn't diverting from the festival's structure or mission, this year will be a sort of stepping out as it broadens its horizons. As Ichthus looks forward to the 40th anniversary of the festival in 2009, Ichthus:08 will not only be the same festival that its attendees have come to love, but also a forerunner of new things to come.

"We're offering more at Ichthus:08 than we have at any festival before," said Jeff James, executive director of Ichthus Ministries, Inc. "With more stages, a new tent for youth leaders, and the missions program, this year will be a great stepping stone into the future of Ichthus."
