Habitat For Humanity of Jessamine County, Kentucky has named Ronald K. Bishoff as it's Executive Director. Mr. Bishoff will oversee all Habitat operations for Jessamine County. Habitat For Humanity's main project is to build "Homes" for those who need "A Hand-Up, Not a Hand-Out". This allows families that may not have been able to afford decent housing to actually own their own home.

Habitat For Humanity in Jessamine County also operates a re-sell store called "The ReStore" located at 317 North Main Street in Nicholasville, KY. This store collects donations of "Gently Used" Furniture, Appliances, Building Supplies and Household Items and re-sells them to the public at "affordable" costs. This Habitat also has opened what is believed to be the first of its kind in the US - its own retail "Flea Market" called "The Vendors' Habitat".

The Vendors' Habitat is composed of over 60 "booths" where individuals can set up their own "Mini-Store" and sell their goods to the public. In exchange they give Habitat a monthly fee and a percentage of their sales.

The "Cans For Homes" and "Cars For Homes" is just beginning, but is growing. Cars, Motorcycles, Boats, etc. can be donated to Habitat and are either re-sold or auctioned off to help provide building materials for homes. The "Car For Homes" programs not only raises funds for Habitat, but also assists in keeping the environment a little cleaner by recycling aluminum cans.

Mr. Bishoff came to Habitat For Humanity of Jessamine County in the fall of 2004 to assist in setting up and starting the "ReStore" concept in Jessamine County.

He was then named Manager of the store. When the ReStore concept grew and the Vendors' Habitat was added, he became the Director of Retail Operations. Ron's background is in construction repair and rehab, retail, finance and marketing; bringing a well rounded background to Habitat.

"We look forward to continued growth in all areas of Habitat with the communities' help. Our fundraising and volunteer efforts will hopefully allow us to grow from building 1 house a year to 3-4 per year in the not too distant future. Habitat For Humanity is a community wide project and cannot be done with one or two people - It takes the entire community to be behind a project like this", Bishoff said. He added, "We are currently in need of land to build homes in Jessamine County and volunteers to assist in our builds, as well as in the ReStore and all areas of Habitat."

## 4th Annual High Bridge Homecoming Festival August 15 -17

Historic High Bridge Park is five miles outside of Wilmore. High Bridge Park overlooks the Kentucky and Dix rivers.
